I was the second pipeline CV-22 student in a group of 4 of us that were the guinea pigs. All previous CV-22s pilots had cross-trained from either the MH-53 or MC-130, so to be in the first group selected out of pilot training was pure luck. After the first group of 4, there was about a year before the next CV-22 dropped at Ft. Rucker, so I guess we convinced them that pipeline students could learn to fly the Osprey given enough instruction. From Rucker, I was off to Marine Corps Air Station New River to learn the fundamentals of V-22 flying from Jim Peterson and then to Kirtland for the CV-22 specific training.

While I was at Kirtland I went back to Wisconsin for a friend's wedding and ended up meeting my wonderful wife, Krista. We had known each other in high school but weren't close back then. We started a long-distance relationship as she was teaching in northern Wisconsin while I finished up at Kirtland. After graduating from Kirtland, I was off to the 8th SOS at Hurlburt Field. Between deployments, Krista moved down to Florida and we got married in 2010.

After deploying to Iraq and Afghanistan, I got an assignment to Kirtland to instruct, so Krista and I took advantage of the slower Ops Tempo to have both of our kids, Owen who is now 11 and Anna, now 8. Operationally, the 7th continues to be called upon when the Nation needs exquisite vertical lift, which seems to be quite often. Shortly after taking command, the majority of the Squadron returned from a short-notice deployment where they assisted with the evacuation of Americans from an active conflict. Prior to that, the 7th supported a POTUS movement across EUCOM for a Key Leader Engagement, providing immediate reaction force infiltration should it have been needed. Currently, the 7th is postured to support contingencies throughout Europe and Africa if the call comes.

Additionally, the 7th is developing tactics, techniques, and procedures, to impose costs and compete with Russia. We continue to seek out opportunities to tackle high-end threat training and just sent a crew to China Lake NAS to fly with the 20th SOS and 14th Weapons Squadron against high-fidelity emitters. We have also been focusing on developing comm capabilities to allow us to integrate with the CAF and ground users through Link-16 and other emerging technologies.

This is an amazing unit and I am very proud to be a part of it. Thank you for the legacy that you laid and the support that you continue to provide. I am humbled every day that there are so many people that have invested so much into making this unit what it is today. THANK YOU!

The 7th Air Commando Society will have a Memorial Bench constructed and dedicated at the AF Museum on Thursday, 26 September 2024, at the end of the day, approximately 4:30 PM. The Bench will be located on the walkway towards the museum, details to be coordinated with the Museum. We have to choose a contractor to build the bench and the museum has provided us with four contractors that have built other benches for organizations. Basically, our Society will dedicate this bench in honor of all member of both squadrons, the 7 ACS (Sembach 1964-68) and 7 SOS (1968-Present)

Attached just for your information is some documentation and examples of inscription and layouts for the 7 ACS dedication of a Memorial Bench in honor of all present and past Air Commandos of the 7th Air Commando Squadron and 7th Special Operations Squadron. Our plan is to include both squadron patches one to the left and one to the right on the base. Buff Underwood is researching with the company that did our Combat Talon memorial and created the porcelain patches for that memorial to see what it would cost for them to do the attached squadron emblems.

Also attached is a simple FIRST Draft proposal of the engraving. This is where I need your help in selecting the proper verbiage, spacing, and font. For Lt Col Meyersohn, please engage your squadron and help us make this memorial one our members will come back to visit often. If you're thinking about also listing our aircraft losses, don't forget our 7 ACS brothers from Sembach also lost some aircraft and lives. I would recommend not go there. We are restricted somewhat on site and type of marble. I recommend we go with the black granite as depicted in two of the photos below.

GRANITE BENCH

The following style of granite bench has been approved as a part of the NMUSAF Memorial Park program:

- The required size of the finished product must be: to seat: 54" x 14" x 4"; o leg: 46" x 8" x 14" high o concrete foundation: 60" x 18" x 24" deep (concrete foundation is only required if bench is not placed on a sidewalk)
- All exposed surfaces must be polished (except bottom of seat)
- Bench sections must be pinned together
- Bench must be made from one of the following types of granite: Barre Gray, American Black, Impala Black, India Black, Asian Granite Cost
- Payment to the Air Force Museum Foundation, Inc. (for perpetual care) \$500.00
- Cost of bench, foundations, etc. Estimate: \$3,000-\$5,000 The total cost of placing a bench at the National Museum of the U.S. Air Force will probably cost between \$4,000 and \$7,000. This will include a one-time payment to the Air Force Museum Foundation, Inc. for the perpetual care of the bench.

The cost of the bench will greatly depend on several things: the type of granite, complexity of lettering, carving, foundation work, etc. It is suggested that you get estimates from more than one contractor. ALL ENGRAVING OR ETCHINGS (WORDS AND PICTURES) MUST BE APPROVED BY THE NMUSAF PRIOR TO CONTRACTING WITH A MONUMENT COMPANY.

We are also in the very early stages of planning our THIRD 7 SOS Reunion returning to our Squadron at RAF Mildenhall, unless of course someone has an incredible idea to move the squadron again. 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Fulton Surface to Air Recovery (STAR)

Twenty-seven years ago, a 30-year practice ended for Air Force Special Operations when members of the 8th Special Operations Squadron conducted the final Fulton Surface-to-Air Recovery (STAR) system training mission in the MC-130E Combat Talon I, tail number 0568, at Hurlburt Field, Florida.

Originally developed for the CIA by inventor Robert Edison Fulton, Jr. in the 1950s, the Fulton system was adopted by the Air Force in the 1960s. Fulton's system evolved from a similar system that was used during World War II by American and British forces to retrieve both personnel and downed assault gliders following airborne operations.

The STAR system, though infrequently used, was transformative for personnel recovery in special operations missions. In its final mission, this MC-130E, made nine recovery passes to end the AFSOC Fulton STAR mission.

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Phase I of Construction Complete as AFSOC Prepares to Open Hurlburt Field Airpark to Public



With names like Wicked Wanda, The Ultimate End and Big Daddy, there's a story behind each aircraft and monument on display at the Hurlburt Field Memorial Airpark.

For the first time in more than 20 years, Hurlburt Field plans to open its airpark to the general public in spring 2024 - allowing visitors to see the aircraft first-hand and learn more about the history of Air Force Special Operations Command.

"We are dedicated to preserving the legacy of our Air Commandos and we want to share our mission - past, present and future - with our community," said Lt. Gen. Tony Bauernfeind, AFSOC commander. "We look forward to educating and inspiring our visitors about the rich heritage and traditions that we have here at Hurlburt Field and within AFSOC."

The park, a one-hour drive from Pensacola, Florida and a three-hour drive from Tallahassee, Florida – features static displays of more than 20 aircraft, flown during eras ranging from World War II to the Korean War and Vietnam War through the Cold War, in addition to the Global War on Terror.

Aircraft featured in the park include an AC-119G Shadow, C-46D Commando, B-25J Mitchell, HH-3E Jolly Green, AC-47D Spooky, T-28A Trojan and an O-1E Bird Dog, to name a few.

"Even in their silence, airplanes tell a story," said AFSOC historian Todd Schroeder. "They tell the story of our Air Commandos, operations, missions and achievements."

Crews that flew on The Ultimate End, for example, remember March 4, 1972, as both the luckiest and unluckiest day of their lives. That night, enemy anti-aircraft artillery struck the AC-130A Spectre gunship, causing severe damage to the structure of the aircraft.

Likewise, Wicked Wanda, an AC-130H Spectre gunship on display at the airpark, deployed in nearly every conflict the U.S. has been involved in, officially and unofficially, since the end of the Vietnam War.

Big Daddy, on the other hand, earned its name as the "father" of the AC-130U Gunship fleet.

In addition to aircraft, the park includes memorials and monuments dedicated to honoring AFSOC heroes, including Master Sgt. John Chapman, a special tactics combat controller who made the ultimate sacrifice to protect his teammates during a conflict in Afghanistan in 2002 and was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for his actions.

"The airpark is special because it's a tangible timeline of special operations and Hurlburt Field," Schroeder added. "It shows how our Air Commandos innovated and adapted and never settled for the status-quo."

At this time, officials expect the airpark to open to the public in spring 2024. Additionally, there are plans to expand the park to include a museum and heritage center at a later date.

As construction continues, visitors with base access are able to tour the airpark. Plans to expand the park are being coordinated in partnership with the Air Commando Association, a nonprofit veterans organization committed to preserving the heritage of Air Commandos and to honor their contributions.





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In Memoriam





James L. Hobson, Major Gen. (Ret) July 16, 1942 - May 17, 2023

ACA is saddened to report that Major Gen (Ret) James L. Hobson, Jr. has taken his last flight. Gen Hobson commanded Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC), Hurlburt Field, Florida from July 1994 to July 1997. During his command, AFSOC operated one wing, three flying groups and a Special Tactics Group with more than 100 aircraft and 11,900 personnel assigned worldwide. As 8th SOS Commander, Gen Hobson courageously led the airfield seizure and rescue of Americans at Point Salines Airport, Grenada in Operation URGENT FURY. His efforts resulted in being awarded the 1983 Mackay Trophy, for the most meritorious flight of the year. Hobson became the Commander of the 8th SOS prior to the crisis in Grenada. After his heroic actions in Operation URGENT FURY, he and others were personally thanked by President Reagan. Gen Hobson also served as the Vice and then Commander of 39th Special Operations Wing at Eglin AFB, FL. After promotion to Brigadier General in 1989, Gen Hobson became the Vice Commander of 23rd AF at Hurlburt Field, and assisted in the planning of the Panama invasion in December 1989. He commanded the 322nd Airlift Division, Ramstein AB, Germany and orchestrated the massive logistical air bridge through Europe in support of Operation DESERT STORM. Next, he commanded the 435th Airlift Wing at Rhein-Main AB, Germany and then became the Director of Operations and Transportation at Air Mobility Command. Major General James Hobson retired in 1997 as a command pilot with 6,850 military flying hours. He is a member of the Air Commando Hall of Fame and the USSOCOM Commando Hall of Honor. RIP sir and blessings to your wife Diane, family and friends.

MAJOR GENERAL JAMES L. HOBSON, JR. UNITED STATES AIR FORCE (RETIRED)

Major General James L. Hobson, Jr., distinguished himself during a lifetime of service to the United States and Special Operations Forces in a myriad of assignments. Major General Hobson's contributions to Special Operations aviation, Air Commandos and their unique brand of airpower, are inscribed throughout the history of Air Force Special Operations. While on active duty, he held command of groups and wings, both stateside and overseas. His most notable command positions were serving as Commander, 39th Special Operations Wing at Eglin Air Force Base, Florida, and as Vice Commander, 23rd Air Force, Hurlburt Field, Florida. His career in Special Operations culminated his selection and final assignment as Commander, Air Force Special Operations Command, Hurlburt Field, Florida. Major General Hobson's unwavering loyalty, devotion to duty, and lifetime of dedication reflect great credit upon himself, Special Operations Forces, and the United States Special Operations Command.

Joseph Leonard Di Vito, Lt. Col. (Ret) December 1, 1956 ~ July 12, 2023

Joseph Leonard Di Vito, Lt Col (Ret), USAF, died in the early morning hours of July 12, 2023 at the age of 66. His wife, Patricia Di Vito, was by his side when he passed at the Hillsboro Medical Center. Joe suffered from several health issues over the years, surviving through grit and determination until his body could not continue. Joe and Tricia were married Dec. 1, 2020. They were both born on December 1, so they knew their wedding day had to be on that date, as well. Joe found true love with Tricia and enjoyed the fullness of family during their marriage, spending time between their beach house in Rockaway Beach, Ore., and an apartment in Hillsboro, Ore.

As an Air Force navigator in four variants of the large C-130 cargo planes, Joe traveled the world, including 10 months in the desert based in Kuwait, Oman, and Qatar. His work supported missions in Iraq, Afghanistan, and other areas around the globe. After 31 years, Joe retired from the Air Force in 2012 with 7,814 flying hours logged. He was extremely proud of his military career and the lifelong friendships forged during his service.

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The Last of Them: The boneyard receives final MC-130H Talon II



On April 2, the final MC-130H Combat Talon II made its last flight, arriving at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Arizona to retire at the 309th Aerospace Maintenance and Regeneration Group (AMARG). This aircraft was the last of the final six MC-130Hs transferred for storage at the 309th AMARG, known as the boneyard.

The aircraft, tail number 89-0280 belonging to the 1st Special Operations Wing, was flown by a Total Force crew and included Lt Gen Tony Bauernfeind, AFSOC commander, to pay homage to the heroic legacy and service the Talon II has provided for AFSOC and the joint force over the past 30 years.

"Today marks the end of a legacy for one of the finest airplanes ever flown in AFSOC," said Bauernfeind. "The MC-130H Combat Talon II, or as the crews that've flown it call it: "The *Chariot of Armageddon*," held a critical mission of special operations forces mobility in infiltrating and exfiltrating into many of the hardest locations in the world while upholding the Talon Standard of absolute precision. I'm very proud of the entire Talon community; the crews, maintainers, and operations support personnel."

Initially arriving at Hurlburt Field in June 1992, the MC-130H Combat Talon II is a derivative of the C-130H Hercules modified for special operations and played a vital role in AFSOC operations across the globe.

The mission of the Combat Talon II was to provide infiltration, exfiltration, and resupply of special operations forces and equipment in hostile and denied territories, while also providing a secondary air refueling capability for helicopters and vertical lift platforms. Additionally, it also provided SOF commanders with an all-weather, low-level penetration option utilizing its terrain following capabilities.

The standard aircrew complement for the MC-130H was seven consisting of two pilots, a navigator, two loadmasters, a flight engineer, and an electronic warfare officer.

"The Talon II was a navigator's dream due to the planning required and systems expertise necessary to fly it," said Col. Richard Greszler, Jr., AFSOC Operations Center commander and prior MC-130H navigator.

"The ability to fly in mountainous terrain in [instrument meteorological conditions] required extremely detailed mission planning, so every flight required the whole crew to understand the limitations of the aircraft and the crew, and to push right up to the edge in order to be successful. The ability to project power and penetrate denied or sensitive areas to further our Nation's interest was the hallmark of the Talon II."

Over the last 30 years, the Combat Talon II was critical to many missions from evacuations of civilians from the Republic of the Congo in 1997, to enduring counterterror and counter-violent extremist organizations (C-VEO) operations.

"The legacy of the Talon II fills me with pride," Greszler said. "Pride in a community which looked to be tasked to defend our Nation no matter the danger. The aircraft was an amazing machine, but it was the men and women who crewed and maintained the Chariot of Armageddon that made it special. They constantly strove to improve and never let their teammates down."

With the completion of the final trip to AMARG, the MC-130H fleet has approximately 264,442 total flight hours and 106,850 sorties since its start of operations in late 1992.

Replacing the MC-130H, along with the retired E and P models, is the MC-130J Commando II, which has been in operation since 2011.

The Commando II flies clandestine, or low visibility, single or multi-ship, low-level infiltration, exfiltration, and resupply of special operations forces, by airdrop or airland and air refueling missions for special operations helicopters and tiltrotor aircraft, intruding politically sensitive or hostile territories. The MC-130J primarily flies missions at night to reduce probability of visual acquisition and intercept by airborne threats.


The last MC-130H in the 1st SOW's inventory will be retired later this summer in Hurlburt Field's airpark, cementing the retirement of the Talon II fleet in AFSOC.

Below are a few of the notable MC-130H tail numbers and missions that highlight the various missions the Combat Talon II will be remembered for:

89-0280: Coined "The Highlander", 89-0280 is one of the few Combat Talon II aircraft to have been stationed at every permanent duty location for Talon II aircraft, it was later the first aircraft to respond and land at Sendai International Airport during Operation Tomadachi following the 9.0 earthquake and tsunami in Fukushima, Japan on March 16, 2011. The mission to Sendai opened the airfield for mass follow-on relief missions, and the first C-17 was able to land four hours later.

85-0011: Coined "The Ace of Spades", aircraft 85-0011 is known for transporting Saddam Hussein after his capture near the town of Tikrit in December 2003. Additionally, this aircraft participated in earthquake relief efforts during a 1997 JCET down in Venezuela. During the immediate aftermath, the crew of 0011 airlifted 175,000 lbs of supplies and received the Order of Jose Antonio Anzoategui, Venezuela's highest medal for gallantry.

86-1699: Coined "Merlin's Magic", it participated in Operation Firm Response to conduct a 14.4 flight hour NEO of 56 non-combatants from the Republic of the Congo in 1997.

89-0283: This aircraft was the fourth of four Talons that opened OEF as a Rhino Raider in 2001. Rhino LZ was the first combat airfield seizure in Afghanistan in 2001. Additionally, 0283 conducted the exfil of Hamid Karzai on November 4, 2001. This aircraft also conducted a BLU-82 drop on Masire-Sharif and participated in the 2008 Colombia hostage rescue.





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New Wing at Davis-Monthan Will Include MC-130s, 'Light Attack' CSAF Says

The Special Operations "Power Projection Wing" planned for Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, Ariz., will include MC-130s and "light attack" aircraft—probably the new Sky Wardens—Chief of Staff Gen. Charles Q. Brown Jr. told Congress on April 27.

The new mix of Air Force Special Operations Command aircraft will replace the A-10s now based at Davis-Monthan as they are retired in coming years.

The Air Force cited plans for the 492nd Power Projection Wing in its 2024 budget request and <u>subsequently confirmed those plans to Air & Space Forces Magazine</u>. But exactly which aircraft would be included was not clear until now.

Asked by Rep. Ruben Gallego (D-Ariz.) to provide more details, Brown said the Power Projection Wing would be "bringing in our MC-130s [and] light attack aircraft."

The MC-130 is a tanker/mobility aircraft, used by Special Operations Forces for covert day, night, and adverse weather infiltration, exfiltration, and resupply. Based on the Air Tractor AT-802 crop duster, the heavily modified <u>Sky Warden won the Armed Overwatch competition</u>. The aircraft will replace Air Force Special Operations Command's aging fleet of <u>U-28A Draco</u> ISR aircraft and augment remotely piloted <u>MQ-9 Reaper</u> drones when they reach initial operational capability in 2026.

Also headed to Davis-Monthan are new EC-37 Compass Call electronic warfare aircraft and HH-60W Jolly Green II search and rescue helicopters.

"Their access to the ranges that are there in Arizona and in the western United States will increase their training opportunity," Brown said of all the new aircraft.


